## Pledge Summary

Grayslake is a Village located in Northeast Illinois with a population of roughly 21,000. The Village has worked extensively to maintain and create green space in conjunction with development, and places emphasis on planting native plants and other pollinator promoting plants when undertaking landscaping and other projects. Mayor Taylor is committed to protecting the Monarch butterfly population and looks forward to continuing to work to promote local pollinators through the Village's efforts as well as engaging the community about ways they can help the Monarchs at home.

## Action Items Committed for 2024

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)
- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.
- Engage with Homeowners Associations (HOAs), Community Associations or neighborhood organizations to identify opportunities to plant monarch gardens and revise maintenance and mowing programs.

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Plant milkweed and pollinator-friendly native nectar plants along roadsides, medians, or public rights-of-way.
- Earn or maintain recognition for being a wildlife-friendly city by participating in other wildlife and habitat conservation efforts (i.e., National Wildlife Federation's Community Wildlife Habitat program).
- Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.

### Systems Change

- Remove milkweed from the list of noxious plants in city weed / landscaping ordinances (if applicable).
- Increase the percentage of native plants, shrubs and trees that must be used in city landscaping ordinances and encourage use of milkweed, where appropriate.

Milkweed is maintained by the Village of Grayslake public works department. All other groups involved were advised not to mow, water, fertilize, or do anything to potentially damage the areas where milkweed has been planted. Any maintenance required is handled by the Village of Grayslake. Additionally, we have added permanent Native Planting areas in several areas around town along with our annual planting program.

The Cul-De-Sac and Sustainable Neighborhood Program are new programs that have not had signups yet, although there have been discussions with residents/groups. We intend to market these programs more aggressively in the upcoming year. The Neighborhood Partnership program has had several successful projects, and implemented new landscaping designs with native plantings.

They will have to submit lists of plants they wish to plant in these programs, so we are able to make sure that they are only approved native plantings, and encourage residents to add more monarch friendly choices like milkweed. We also intend to begin encouraging residents who take part in our community garden to plant milkweed or other monarch friendly plants.

The Village planted 64,000 milkweed seeds in 2023 to help grow and protect monarch butterflies and other pollinator habitats. These plants continued to be maintained. The Village also plants hundreds of annuals every year both in entrance areas to the Village, and on Village Right-of-Ways and medians. These are native annuals, provided by a local business.

The Village has been designated as a Bird City for a few years. Grayslake has also been named a Tree City USA for the 30th consecutive year.

A variety of programs/general operations involved to maintain these awards. Last year we completed a multi year application and implementation process with the Morton Arboretum to receive a tree planting grant, which resulted in the planting of 250 trees on village owned property.

Starting in 2023, we began work on an overhaul of the Village tree preservation ordinance to bring it into line with the previously mentioned Arboretum grant requirements. This not only meant an update to the list of trees/shrubs that we accepted as Native, but an overhaul of every aspect of the ordinance. This ordinance was adopted this year.
