## Pledge Summary

Grayslake is a Village located in Northeast Illinois with a population of roughly 21,000. The Village has worked extensively to maintain and create green space in conjunction with development, and places emphasis on planting native plants and other pollinator promoting plants when undertaking landscaping and other projects. Mayor Taylor is committed to protecting the Monarch butterfly population and looks forward to continuing to work to promote local pollinators through the Village's efforts as well as engaging the community about ways they can help the Monarchs at home.

## Action Items Committed for 2025

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)
- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.
- Engage with Homeowners Associations (HOAs), Community Associations or neighborhood organizations to identify opportunities to plant monarch gardens and revise maintenance and mowing programs.

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Plant milkweed and pollinator-friendly native nectar plants along roadsides, medians, or public rights-of-way.
- Earn or maintain recognition for being a wildlife-friendly city by participating in other wildlife and habitat conservation efforts (i.e., National Wildlife Federation's Community Wildlife Habitat program).
- Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.

### Systems Change

- Increase the percentage of native plants, shrubs and trees that must be used in city landscaping ordinances and encourage use of milkweed, where appropriate.

The Village of Grayslake has been a long time supporter of environmental groups, and has been a Tree City USA for the past 30 years, and a Bird City for the last 6. Attached is confirmation of our Bird City renewal

Continued efforts in overall sustainability, especially focusing on tree canopy and covers. Village 50/50 tree planting program has continued to be popular, and the village received 2 separate grants to plant hundreds of trees.

The Conservation at Home program is done on private homeowner property and they are reimbursed for their improvements so we don't have exact numbers. Grayslake also contains a Lake County Forest Preserve, which is consistently treated for buckthorn and invasive species removal. Grayslake also has several protected prairies, which are burned to promote healthy growth. Our Public Works team also spent over 500 hours on Brush Removal during the calendar year, which consists of (but not exclusively) Buckthorn removal

So far we have had no signups for these programs, however we have had discussions with a group from one neighborhood in the town regarding the program, and we hope that we may be able to have them sign up in 2026.

They will have to submit lists of plants they wish to plant in these programs, so we are able to make sure that they are only approved native plantings, and encourage residents to add more monarch friendly choices like milkweed.

The Village maintains a community garden for a small number of residents to utilize. We added information to our website for interested residents to encourage them to plant milkweed or other native plants in addition to their food producing crops. The Village is

expanding the community garden to another parcel in town next year, and we will continue to encourage the planting of milkweed and other native plantings.

Worked with Morton Arboretum through a grant to update tree ordinance

The Village in the past year passed an overhauled tree ordinance, which updated the standards within the code and altered the approved list of native trees to be planted on Village property. The Village also received a county grant to plant 200 trees in our downtown nature trail area, which has been completed. The Village also received a 2nd

county grant to plant in an area that had been clear cut, although this work has not yet been started.
