A few park community volunteer groups participated in the creation of park flower gardens, joined with DPR's Horticulturists and Greenhouse staff.

These volunteer groups collaborate with, and engage with the public and DPR staff about flower and native plant gardens, share their ideas, and implement their ideas into pollinator gardens. Denver Park staff created over 30 flower and native plant gardens parkwide in 2023.

This year's annual plant sale and giveaway - Purge Your Spurge event in May 2023 - was a success. Bags of myrtle spurge were brought in, in exchange for native plants from DPR's Greenhouse. Approx 50-100 plants were given away.
