## Pledge Summary

The City of Waukesha is a community of approximately 70,000 residents. Residents are committed to protecting the Monarch Butterfly. The Mayor has supported their efforts and that of staff by endorsing the pledge for several years. The City has a Community Butterfly Garden, milkweed plantings and low mow areas to assist the Monarch. Educational sessions are also offered as part of the Arbor Day Celebration and has been incorporated into the Environmental Education Programs.

## Action Items Committed for 2025

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)
- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.
- Engage with Homeowners Associations (HOAs), Community Associations or neighborhood organizations to identify opportunities to plant monarch gardens and revise maintenance and mowing programs.

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.
- Host or support a monarch neighborhood challenge to engage neighborhoods and homeowners' associations within the community to increase awareness, support community unity around a common mission, and/or create habitat for the monarch butterfly.
- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.
- Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.

- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.

## Systems Change

- Integrate monarch butterfly conservation into the city’s Park Master Plan, Sustainability Plan, Climate Resiliency Plan or other city plans.

Both the Tower Hill Neighborhood Association and the Historic Blair House became officially registered Monarch Waystations in 2025. This included obtaining monarch cages to protect the chrysalis until they hatched. They also ensured water was provided and maintained and expanded the planting of milkweed and other nectar plants for the monarchs.

This park was declared and registered as a historic site by the Waukesha County Historical Society in 2023 and a historical marker placed in the park in early 2024.

The area was seeded due to it's large size instead of individual plants planted. The area seeded was approximately 29,000 square feet at a rate of 13.5 PLS LBS per acre (83 seeds per square foot). Within the planting beds coneflowers and other native nectar plants were planted.

**Please describe the extent of revisions or maintenance to invasive species removal programs, as well as the practices or techniques used to remove the invasive plants.**

Teasel Terminators began in 2025, a revised expansion of our volunteer program that works to remove invasive species from our parks and natural areas. Previously, teasel was only mowed down. We are taking the next step to remove the seed heads completely from the areas to reduce the propagation even more. We continue regular practices such as mowing and spraying when and where applicable and continuing to propagate native plantings and milkweed.
