Pledge Summary

The City of West Hollywood was officially incorporated in 1984. At approximately 1.9 square miles and 35,000 residents, the City maintains eight public parks and one community garden. The city has an overall walkability score of 91. West Hollywood is located in the heart of metropolitan Los Angeles County and has earned a reputation for being “the creative city” with its progressive approach to local government including many critical social movements and its commitment to protect of our environment and combat climate change. Mayor Lauren Meister has committed to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators with the signing of the Mayors’ Monarch Pledge and looks forward to engaging with community members in building more pollinator habitats throughout the city.

Action Items Committed for 2022

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species’ need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. How are you leveraging the Mayors' Monarch Pledge program to engage marginalized communities, such as low-income communities or communities of color?

The Detroit St. Community Garden opened in March 2022. Combining monarch and pollinator habitat with the design of a new community garden increases local food security for residents.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

The City is committed to preserving pollinator species and the many benefits they provide to our quality of life and to the world. We are supported by our City Council, City leaders, and community stakeholders.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

The City struggles to identify large swathes of public land to plant native milkweed (like City parks) due to its toxicity to small children and animals. West Hollywood is a very dog-friendly city. It would be great to learn about best practices and find resources related to this topic.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

The City is maintaining all habitat sites previously created in 2021.

In March 2022, the City opened its new (and only) community garden. At the garden opening event and as a part of the gardener onboarding process, residents were educated about pollinator-friendly plant palettes and benefits of companion planting which aligns with IPM strategies to fight pests with nontoxic planting practices. Attendees were also given free milkweed plants and nectar seeds and many planted their giveaways in their new garden plots.

In 2021, the City planted monarch habitat at five traffic circle locations. In 2022, the City planted monarch habitat at an additional four traffic circle locations. In total, the City has converted nine traffic circles with 5 *Asclepias tuberosa* (Butterfly Weed) in each location and thereby creating 45 monarch habitat plantings to-date at these locations. In 2022, the City also created a Monarch Habitat Demonstration Garden with 63 *Asclepias tuberosa* (Butterfly Weed) in the parkway adjacent to the City Yard. Our next goal is to complete a new policy for planting palettes in public right-of-way locations such as bulbouts, traffic circles, medians, City facilities, City operated parkways, other public right-of-way locations, etc.
