## Pledge Summary

Herculaneum, Missouri is a city in Missouri located along the Mississippi River. Herculaneum is located 35 miles south of St. Louis. The city mayor has taken the pledge since the beginning and have made improvements to city parks, gardens, etc. to enhance the Monarch butterfly population.

## Action Items Committed for 2021

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. - Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.
