Communications and Convening

We are in progress of working with a consultant firm to rewrite ordinances as they relate to boulevard plantings and should be live by March of 2026.

We received a grant in the fall of 2024 to pursue ordinance revisions as it relates to boulevard gardens and tree preservation in public spaces. As part of this rewrite, our goal is to make altering boulevard spaces more attainable for citizens looking to implement more native habitat on their boulevard space.

We've shifted our former "No Mow May" program to "Grow Green". Instead of focusing efforts on reduced mowing for one month, we've shifted the program to encourage sustainable lawncare and reduced mowing for the entire spring/summer season. This includes a kick-off event where interested community members can attend to learn from local organizations promoting sustainable landscaping, and how they can implement these practices in their own properties.

A local non-profit and volunteer organization, Friends of the Blufflands has continued to complete regular invasive species removal in our Bluffland Prairie landscape. This includes cut & treat practices as well as prescribed burns where applicable. The group always leaves refugia for sensitive species.
