## Pledge Summary

The city of Cortland is home to about 6,800 residents. We are located in northeastern Ohio. The city is home to three beautiful parks with a state park adjacent to the city. Mayor Petrosky and the city's Parks & Recreation Board have committed to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators with their signing of the Mayor's Monarch Pledge and looks forward to engaging residents in building more pollinator habitat throughout the city. We will be planting our first pollinator garden in our Willow or Pearl park this year! The city's Rotary Club is also spearheading a community effort for milkweed and pollinator gardens.

## Action Items Committed for 2021

### Communications and Convening
