Pledge Summary

The City of Loretto is a small city, population 664, on the western edge of Hennepin County, Minnesota. Our Mayor and City Council Members have once again unanimously supported taking the Mayors' Monarch Pledge for the fourth year in a row. The city is committed to improving the Monarch habitat through community education, planting and maintaining milkweed and pollinator gardens at city parks and supporting a milkweed seed giveaway.

Our local garden club also hosts a booth at our annual civic event with a wealth of educational materials that are innovative and catch the attention of guests of the event. We also recently ordered a new sign to be placed on our Welcome to Loretto sign, proclaiming our city to be a Mayors' Monarch Pledge city.
