It is currently the most populous jurisdiction in the county with over 38,000 residents. Deerfield Township is committed to helping preserve the monarch butterfly and looks forward to working with community members to make Deerfield Township as attractive to monarch butterflies as it is to its residents and visitors.

## Action Items Committed for 2021

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.
- Engage with gardening leaders and partners (e.g., Master Naturalists, Master Gardeners, Nature Centers, Native Plant Society Chapters , other long-standing and influential community leaders) to support monarch butterfly conservation.

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.
- Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.

Ohio River Foundation held several community volunteer events at Kingswood Park which is roughly 80 acres of parkland. Approximately 1,500 harmful invasive bushes and trees

were removed at each event and they targeted honeysuckle, Callery Pear, Multiflora Rose and Russian Olive. The Service Department provided equipment and followed up with chip[ping the items that were generated by the volunteers.

This work includes the creation of a native prairie, which we spotted the three common milkweeds commonly seen in this area, and also created a prairie trail along with pollinator gardens along the trails.
