The Village of Deerfield is a community located in northeastern Illinois with a population of roughly 19,000. Mayor Shapiro has committed to saving the monarch butterfly population and other pollinators by signing the Mayors' Monarch Pledge. Mayor Shapiro is supportive of growing the native gardens and is engaging with residents to continue building community native gardens.

Action Items Committed for 2023

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Plant milkweed and pollinator-friendly native nectar plants along roadsides, medians, or public rights-of-way.
- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.

The Village has 11 signs displayed showing three different forms of information. These signs are placed at all locations that are either in the process of creating or have a native habitat. The first sign is the Monarch Way Station sign purchased from monarchwatch.org. This sign talks about the benefits of the site for monarch butterflies. The next sign is a pollinator habitat sign which provides information about the site being a habitat for food and shelter for pollinating insects. This sign was created internally. The last sign that we have

displayed is for native restoration in progress which was created internally. This sign is placed at native planting locations that undergoing maintenance to create new habitats.

The Village currently has six established native planting locations with two more in the process of being developed. Some of these locations such as the Wastewater Reclamation Facility has multiple planting areas within the location. The areas are cleared of existing weeds and invasive species and then new seeds are planted. The current established locations are as follows: - Wastewater Reclamation Facility: 42.160079, -87.853739 - Sunset Parking Lot: 42.166371, -87.849710 - Woodvale Ave: 42.179794, -87.840376 - Chestnut and North Ave: 42.181723, -87.854846 - Deerfield and Castlewood Ln: 42.167267, -87.870435, - Elysian Way: 42.167145, -87.829955, The two new locations are: - Price Lane: 42.165378, -87.855759, - Waukegan and Warwick Road: 42.175576, -87.849744 The Village continues to look for more locations to convert into native planting locations and Monarch Habitats. The Village is beginning the process on a few more locations which are slated to start in 2024.

Please describe the maintenance schedule for these planted areas.

The Village has contracted with Foot Stone, Inc. to maintain and restore these locations. The locations are hand weeded and naturally treated to remove weeds throughout the Spring and Summer. Rather than planting already developed plants or plugs, seeds are planted in the Spring and Fall to provide new growth to the locations. The seed list for this year is attached in this section.
