## Pledge Summary

The City of McAllen is a city in south Texas with a population of roughly 142,000. It is the largest city in Hidalgo County of the Lower Rio Grande Valley, a region known for its high biodiversity and as an ecotourism destination. Mayor Javier Villalobos of McAllen, Texas has committed to conserving the monarch butterfly and the pollinator community that are so important to ecosystem and economic health. Mayor Villalobos looks forward to engaging residents and creating more pollinator habitat throughout the city

## Action Items Committed for 2023

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. **Please describe the milkweed seed collection and propagation effort that you hosted.**

This was an in-house effort by the Center for Urban Ecology team at Quinta Mazatlan to save seed from and propagate Zizotes Milkweed (*Asclepias oenotheroides*). We collected seed from over 25 individuals over the year and saved well over 150 seeds. We are currently in process of germinating seeds. Any plants that result will be used either on-site, or sold (such as in association with native plant gardening workshops).

Significant site preparation efforts (including over 4 months of silage tarping) to control introduced grasses (e.g. bermuda grass). Dense planting to reduce time period in which grasses are receiving enough light to thrive. Added 3 inches of mulch after planting for additional weed suppression. In-ground sprinkler system for watering.

We supported the City Nature Challenge 2023 by being co-organizers of the community science event. Prior to the event we hosted trainings, did outreach to encourage folks to participate, and did the background organizer tasks as required for participation. During the event, we sent staff to document the plants and wildlife at some of the parks and roadsides that we maintain pollinator-friendly habitats to make observations. Over 11,000 observations were made during the event, including 570 of butterflies. No monarchs were documented during the CNC, which was from April 28 - May 1. Additionally, we also curate Monarch inaturalist observations made during the year by adding life stage annotations and nectar plant observation fields. This results in data that helps showcase the seasonality of monarchs in the RGV and build data on which nectar plant species they are predominantly seen using.

Monarch Fest is an annual event we have put on in the City of McAllen for over 5 years. It is held every year at Quinta Mazatlan, a highly visible and accessible location (it is off of a major roadway that has bus routes for ease of access). It was held on 4/1/2023 following several weeks of outreach/marketing to ensure that the greatest number of people in the community were aware of it in the hopes that they would attend. It featured educational booths, local small business vendors, featured native plant sales, garden tours, cultural dances and music, book reading, scout badge activities, and more.
