For make A Difference Day, we partnered with Make A Difference Day and Mannheim School to have about 40 kids help us plant at both Clock Tower Park and Denley Avenue. These kids helped put together the planter boxes, till the area, and plant the plants. They also participated in presentations regarding pollinator plants and healthy habits for the environment. The Various Village of Schiller Park Departments showed up with equipment and helped the kids plant. We also had 50 kids join us on Arbor Day from our Kidz Klub

(through Schiller Park's Parks and Recreation Department) to plant a tree, learn more about tree conservation, and engage in fun learning activities. These kids and their parents also got to take home wild flower seed packets!

Scouts of Chicago, Make a Difference Day (MADD), The Schiller Park Public Library, Village of Schiller Park Parks and Recreation Department, Village of Schiller Park Administrative Staff, The Village of Schiller Park Board of Trustees, Manheim School, Schiller Park Fire Department, Schiller Park Police Department, and the Schiller Park Public Works Department.

**Please describe the extent of engagement with these groups and revisions/maintenance implemented for mowing or planting programs.**

We utilized volunteers and community members from Make a Difference Day, Manheim School, The Public Library and various Schiller Park departments to plant native and pollinator plants at both Clock Tower Park and Denley Avenue. This included tilling the land and helping make the custom planter boxes at Denley Avenue. The Village of Schiller Park Fire Department, Parks and Recreation Department, and the Public Works Department then watered the plants weekly.
