## Pledge Summary

The City of Oceanside, founded in 1888, is a coastal city located between San Diego and Los Angeles. We are a designated "California Cultural District" and have a highly-rated thriving downtown scene, plenty of open space, miles of beautiful beaches, unique architecture and historic buildings, and an efficient transportation hub. Mayor Sanchez is committed to urging the community to create and maintain essential monarch habitat so that monarchs and other pollinators will thrive!

## Action Items Committed for 2022

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Plant milkweed and pollinator-friendly native nectar plants along roadsides, medians, or public rights-of-way.
- Initiate or support community science (or citizen science) efforts that help monitor monarch migration and health.
- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.

### Systems Change

- Launch, expand, or continue an effort to change municipal planting ordinances and practices to include more native milkweed and native nectar producing plants at city properties.

The Mayor and City Manager's Office communications staff engaged the City's Public Works Department staff to explain the project and identify any City-owned areas that might be appropriate for native plant seeding. This far, a large public area at a City facility, a lengthy slope, and a City Park have have been seeded as of Spring 2022.

In February 2022, City staff began a native seed project at the City's Operations Center on Oceanside Boulevard (photo attached of outreach efforts in the community). Since then, another area at Mance Buchanon Park has been seeded.

A "Monarch Waystation" sign was purchased and will be installed at the City Operations Center where native habitat was planted. The sign encourages the planting of native milkweed as a food source for monarchs. Staff plans to order more and install at the Mance Buchanan Park seeding location, and other spots as we go.

We inquired about a native plant giveaway by a local organization but were unsuccessful.
