Pledge Summary

The City of Alamo (Alamo) was incorporated in 1924 and is a municipal government which is a Home Ruled city. This gives the city full power of local self-government, including the right to amend their adopted City Charter, as provided by the Constitution & laws of the State. Alamo was named for the Alamo Land and Sugar Company that is located within 7 miles of the Texas-Mexico border and serves as one of the Rio Grande Valley's gateways to Mexico. Alamo has been nicknamed the "Land of Two Summers", as Winter Texans and other visitors total 34,000 per year. Every winter, an estimated 20,000 Winter Texans live up to eight months in the City of Alamo. The City of Alamo is also called the "Refuge to the Valley" since traveling through Alamo will take you straight to the Santa Ana National Wildlife Refuge. It is a favorite of birdwatchers from all regions of the world. The city has been a grant recipient with the World Butterfly Center located in Mission, Texas for the establishment of butterfly gardens throughout the city. Through this grant award we able to plant 7 gardens (library, day care center, housing authority, 1 city parks, youth center, 2 elementary schools) and get staff trained on the appropriate maintenance of these gardens. The city is continuously working with Santa Ana Wildlife Refuge on the expansion and appropriate upkeep of these gardens. The city is in the process of creating 4 more butterfly gardens at city parks and expanding 3 current ones.

Action Items Committed for 2023

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.
- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.

Systems Change

- Integrate monarch butterfly conservation into the city's Park Master Plan, Sustainability Plan, Climate Resiliency Plan or other city plans.

gardens that will assist Monarch Butterflies in their migration south and Santa Anna Wildlife Refuge is a large area them to thrive. The City of Alamo hopes by educating and creating more Monarch Gardens, it can help continue to bring the Monarchs to our city.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

In recent years the City of Alamo has had a strong working relationship with its schools, by engaging our students we have been able to build gardens and educate students on the importance of our environment. The City of Alamo did have some trouble receiving milkweed plants this year, a plant that has helped us create these gardens in the past. In the future the cites hopes to create new gardens every year but would need these plants to do so..

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

Though the city was not able to plant new gardens this year, we used the time to educate our students on the importance of our environment. Through our Planning and Public Works Departments, the city was able to reach out 5 different schools, reeducating and raising awareness about our Monarch Butterflies and the gardens built in the past here in The City of Alamo.
