Pledge Summary

Raleigh, population 480,000, is one of the fastest-growing cities in the country. The capital, and second-largest city in North Carolina, Raleigh is known as the "City of Oaks" for its many oak trees, which line the streets in the heart of the city. The City's vision is, "To pursue world-class quality of life by actively collaborating with our community towards a fulfilling and inspired future for all."

Action Items Committed for 2021

Communications and Convening

How are you leveraging the Mayors' Monarch Pledge program to engage marginalized communities, such as low-income communities or communities of color?

We have been using this platform to expand our reach into marginalized communities by developing pollinator demonstration gardens in parks within these communities and also teaching classes on how to plant native gardens. In addition, we also engaged a youth conservation corp which was made up primarily of youth from marginalized communities and their activities were focused around conservation, including the development of a pollinator garden at one of those parks.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

Raleigh is considered to be a city within a park and we recognize the need to not only conserve our natural resources, but also provide opportunities for our wildlife to have safe places. We feel that we are doing a great job in being stewards of our park lands, but also wanted to affiliate with groups and organizations to help elevate the profile of the work we are doing.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

We have been growing our own plants in our greenhouse which has helped plus we have staff who are very passionate about this work and either incorporate pollinator gardens into their landscape work or educate the public any chance they get. Once possible opportunity would be for NWF to offer small grants for schools or non profits to build their own pollinator habitats.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

We continue to look for areas to expand to and also convert previously highly maintained park areas to meadow/prairie areas.
