Pledge Summary

The City of South Padre Island is directly in the path of the Monarch Coastal Flyway in the most important state for eastern migratory Monarchs. Our community strives to live harmoniously with nature and pledges to become a city-wide haven for migratory Monarchs by creating and managing habitat and through community awareness and education.

Action Items Committed for 2021

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)
- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.
- Engage with gardening leaders and partners (e.g., Master Naturalists, Master Gardeners, Nature Centers, Native Plant Society Chapters, other long-standing and influential community leaders) to support monarch butterfly conservation.
- Engage with Homeowners Associations (HOAs), Community Associations or neighborhood organizations to identify opportunities to plant monarch gardens and revise maintenance and mowing programs.
- Create a community-driven educational conservation strategy, initiative, or practice that focuses on and benefits local, underserved residents.
- Create a community art project to enhance and promote monarch and pollinator conservation as well as cultural awareness and recognition.

- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Facilitate or support a milkweed seed collection and propagation effort.
- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.

- Initiate or support community science (or citizen science) efforts that help monitor monarch migration and health.
- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.
- Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.
- Host or support a monarch butterfly festival that is accessible to all residents in the community and promotes monarch and pollinator conservation, as well as cultural awareness and recognition.
- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.

Systems Change

- Change weed or mowing ordinances to allow for native prairie and plant habitats.
- Launch, expand, or continue an effort to change municipal planting ordinances and practices to include more native milkweed and native nectar producing plants at city properties.
- Integrate monarch butterfly conservation into the city's Park Master Plan, Sustainability Plan, Climate Resiliency Plan or other city plans.

It was a very tough year for us on SPI. We suffered a deep freeze event in Feb and recovering from it took a lot of time away from Public Works staff, SPI Birding Center staff, and the city of SPI as a whole. It think the time it took to recover set us back in our Monarch Mayor's Pledge action items this year, but hopefully we can bounce back better this coming year. We are learning to communicate a lot better between entities involved and we are building a really good crew of people. We feel hopeful for the future.

Every fall the South Padre Island Birding & Nature Center hosts its annual "HalloWings Monarch Migration Celebration" on the Halloween weekend, which usually coincides with the peak of fall Monarch migration through our area (coastal flyway). We have a Halloween/Monarch themed celebration where we have live music, vendors, playgrounds, sandcastle building, and of course we have a big Native Plant Sale, "Gardening for Monarchs" presentation, butterfly garden tours, Monarch ecology crafts and games for kids, and more! It has become a popular fall event in the city and our gardens are in peak bloom during our event.
