Pledge Summary

The city of South Padre Island is 4 miles long on a barrier island along the Monarch's coastal flyway. The City of SPI with the help of community members have joined forces to help make the city a waystation for Monarchs in migration.

Action Items Committed for 2022

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.
- Engage with gardening leaders and partners (e.g., Master Naturalists, Master Gardeners, Nature Centers, Native Plant Society Chapters , other long-standing and influential community leaders) to support monarch butterfly conservation.

- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.
- Initiate or support community science (or citizen science) efforts that help monitor monarch migration and health.
- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.
- Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.
- Host or support a monarch butterfly festival that is accessible to all residents in the community and promotes monarch and pollinator conservation, as well as cultural awareness and recognition.
- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.

Under the direction of the City of SPI Parks & Recreation and the SPI Birding Center, volunteer planting days were organized and scheduled. Community members of all ages

were invited to participate. We planted native plants that have been proven to grow well under the salty and windy conditions of South Padre Island. We planted native Berlandier's Fiddlewood, Texas Lantana, Seaside Goldenrod, Betony-leaf Misflower, Crucita, Texas Wild Olive, Mexican Taxis and others. We have found out that these nectar plants are local favorites to Monarchs, particularly during fall migration.

This year our "HalloWings" Monarch Migration Celebration was FREE for the first time to all community members! We had Monarch ecology education tables that thought about Monarch lifecycle, ecology, migration, and conservation. We also hosted a native plant sale, a butterfly walk, a costume contest, and had entertainment by local musicians and artists. This has become a well-established yearly event that a lot of the community looks forward to every year.

The City of SPI has a "Native Habitat Lot" ordinance that owners of vacant lots can apply for. If the lot passes requirements (lot must have a dune, wetland, or be comprised of mainly native plant, or hold "Monarch Habitat"), it is protected from mowing. Quite a few of these lots hold native nectar plants and Zizotes Milkweed. See attached Native Habitat lot application. The City of SPI Parks and Rec along with the Public Works Department have manages a City Monarch Waystation. Plants are supplemented yearly to ensure adequate habitat at the right time of year, which for us is mainly fall migration.

Parks and Recreation Committee allots part of their budget to buy native plants each year to supplement the city's Monarch Waystation.

The City Monarch Waystation showcases a big Monarch sculpture as a centerpiece and presents its certified Monarch Waystation sign underneath. A sign depicting the butterfly lifecycle is also on display. The SPI Birding Center has a large wooden Monarch at the entrance way to the visitor center where visitors can take a photo as a Monarch. The Monarch is also right next to the birding center's Monarch Waystation and its respective signage.

Mainly picking invasive grasses from planting beds at the start of every season, and mainly by hand. Guinea Grass and Bermuda grasses being the main invasives that we deal with. Most of these actions are done by volunteers at the SPI Birding Center. The City of SPI Public Works crew also does seasonal removal of grasses and weeds from city parks and the City Monarch Waystation.

This year a RGV Texas Master Naturalist Volunteer actively tagged Monarchs throughout the fall migration. She was able to tag 93 Monarchs during the fall migration from October to November. She tagged 53 at the SPI Birding Center and the rest at city parks and gardens.
