Pledge Summary

Winnetka, the Native American term for “beautiful land”, is a 12,000 person Village known for its mature tree canopy, sandy beaches, outstanding parks, and renowned schools nestled along Lake Michigan’s north shore of Chicago. By signing the Mayors Monarch Pledge, President Rintz and the Village Council demonstrate their commitment to preserve and enhance the health and biodiversity of this “beautiful land” by increasing habitat for the monarch butterfly and other pollinators through example and education.

Action Items Committed for 2021

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species’ need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.

Systems Change

- Integrate monarch butterfly conservation into the city’s Park Master Plan, Sustainability Plan, Climate Resiliency Plan or other city plans.

Where is the demonstration garden located and how does this location relate to the cultural significance of the monarch (if relevant)? (Please provide an address or coordinates, if possible)

The demonstration garden is located at 1390 Willow Road, Winnetka, IL 60093. It is part of a culture of conservation in Illinois that ensures future biodiversity and flourishing pollinator habitat across diverse urban and rural landscapes in our state. Our plan is for it to become part of a network of pollinator-friendly spaces in our Village, which we will track using resources provided by the Xerces Society for Invertebrate Conservation and/or Homegrown National Park, a movement co-founded by Doug Tallamy.

This is a true community effort. The garden was planted by an Eagle Scout candidate and is maintained by various Village staff and volunteer groups throughout the year, including the Winnetka Environmental and Forestry Commission, local non-profits, schools, faith houses, and more.

The Village Council engaged a consultant to lead the Comprehensive Planning process, which began pre-pandemic and continued very intentionally post-pandemic. Numerous individual, organizational, and institutional stakeholders provided input. Sustainability was a high priority across the board. The Consultant helped integrate sustainability throughout the Comprehensive Plan, as well as include a standalone chapter on Sustainability. Our Environmental and Forestry Commission and local environmental, non-profit, worked with the other commissions, consultant, and village staff to provide input regarding pollinator-friendly habitat and natives where appropriate.

The management of this garden is being transitioned from the Eagle Scout and volunteers who designed it to the Winnetka Environmental and Forestry Commission and local environmental non-profit, Go Green Winnetka. The garden is still being maintained but we expect a new schedule and plan for education and maintenance moving forward, to emphasize the "community" part of the demonstration garden. We expect this shift to be completed within the next several months.
