We will continue to grow our monarch garden and will encourage our ratepayers to do the same.

Action Items Committed for 2021

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. helpful. We are a very small office with the summer being our busiest time, sadly we do not have a lot of resource to put towards this during this time of year.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

We are a small office with few resources. We struggle to reach people and to engage our community. Any supports you could provide catered to smaller areas with smaller populations would be beneficial. We have heard from residents who wanted to plant milkweed in their gardens that it has been hard to source at our local garden stores.

Due to COVID-19 our office and our facilities were closed, as a result we were limited to using social media to communicate to the public. We shared the attached poster, which encouraged residents to plant and send us photos of their monarch gardens. The poster

was shared on our Facebook page on a regular basis, as well as on our website and was emailed out to our subscriber list. Unfortunately we only got a handful of pictures back but were told by many that they had planted milkweed or would be planting it.
