Pledge Summary

Cedar Rapids is the second-largest city in Iowa and in the county seat of Linn County. The city lies on both banks of the Cedar River and has a population of approximately 136,429. Cedar Rapids is happy to take part in this pledge and is committed to participating in environmental initiatives that help with monarch and pollinator conservation.

Action Items Committed for 2024

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.

Cedar Rapids is committed to restoring native habitat on public land and prioritizing green infrastructure.

We are in a period of staff transition in the Parks Department (the primary department engaged in this effort), so a review of the goals and benefits of participating in the Mayors' Monarch Pledge would be helpful.

This year, the final concept plans for the Cedar Rapids Greenway Park were presented to the public. Working with consultants, the City of Cedar Rapids created an actionable and forward-thinking update for the Greenway Parks Plan. This plan prioritizes collaboration,

community engagement, technical innovation, flood resilience, and thoughtful stewardship. Informed by the community and the conditions of the floodway, this updated plan outlines critical interventions to improve connections to the waterfront and provide a range of public programs that support local needs. A key feature of the plan is the introduction of naturalistic, native plantings and the creation of wildlife habitat. At the residential level, Cedar Rapids incentivizes residents to install rain gardens and bioswales comprised of natives plants to provide habitat and address stormwater runoff.

There are several native gardens at Noelridge Park (4900 Council Street NE, Cedar Rapids) that serve as educational gardens. We also have added native plants to other City parks, including Fairview Park (502 Vernon Drive SE, Cedar Rapids), Anderson Park (505 21st Street SE), and Bever Park (2700 Bever Avenue SE). City staff also installed a native garden with over 30 species of plants at the Cedar Rapids Art Museum in 2022 and will be adding more species next spring. In addition, the City has restored 343 acres of native prairie in parks and on public property throughout the city.

The City has installed educational signs at restored prairie in Noelridge and Hughes Parks and in the native gardens at Noelridge. These signs explain why native plants are beneficial and highlights the pollinators that are associated with them. The City also posts signs at events such as the Mother's Day Expo/Native Plant Sale explaining what the native plants available for purchase will look like when they are full grown. These signs also provide information about each species.

Please describe the community art project that was implemented in your community and how it contributed to cultural awareness and recognition (e.g., number of art installations, type of art).

A mural depicting native Iowa ecosystems was completed this year on the Noelridge Park Greenhouses. The three Iowa native ecosystems featured are the Oak Savannah, Tallgrass Prairie, and Prairie Garden. A total of over 40 species are depicted on the mural, representing native plants, pollinators and birds that call Iowa home. This project was the culmination of three years of hard work by the Friends of Noelridge to pay for the mural. "We hope visitors to the Greenhouse will embrace the I Spy theme of all the native plants and animals either with a self-guided tour or a scheduled guided tour. The three children depicted in the mural are from the Noelridge Neighborhood," said Mary Moore, Friends of Noelridge President. The City also worked with artists to install traffic signal box art featuring monarch butterflies at five southwest Cedar Rapids locations in the spring of 2024. The signal box art projects feature a theme of monarch butterflies in a variety of color and graphic schemes to enhance these public spaces in highly visible areas. In addition, artists were invited to create designs inspired by sustainability and climate action for vinyl art "vehicle wraps" that were installed on some of the City's solid waste and recycling trucks. This vibrant artwork featuring pollinators rolls into neighborhoods on a weekly basis.
