Pledge Summary

Founded in 1778, the City of Louisville is the largest city in the Commonwealth of Kentucky and sits on the banks of the Ohio River. Mayor Craig Greenberg is continuing Louisville's support and is joining over 600 fellow mayors across the U.S. in support of monarch butterfly and pollinator conservation by signing the National Wildlife Federation's "Mayor's Monarch Pledge". With the monarch butterfly population declining by 80% over the last 20 years, and the 2023-2024 overwintering population in Mexico reaching the second lowest level ever recorded, the monarch butterfly has emerged as an ambassador species to raise awareness for all pollinators and ecosystem health about their need for milkweed plants as well as other native wildflowers and grasses that provide nectar for food and habitat. Mayor Greenberg is dedicated to environmental health by supporting sustainable monarch conservation efforts through encouraging, educating, and empowering citizens that their efforts to create more pollinator habitat throughout the community can have a lasting impact on wildlife and human health. The Louisville Zoo is an accredited member of the Association of Zoos & Aquariums (AZA) and an agency of the Louisville Metro Government. The Louisville Zoo is also partner of the AZA's Saving Animals From Extinction (S.A.F.E.) North American Monarch Butterfly Program.

Action Items Committed for 2024

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. The Louisville Zoo maintains a dedicated webpage for monarch butterfly conservation with numerous links for site visitors to access organizations such as Monarch Watch and Monarch Joint Venture for information on how to develop a monarch butterfly/native pollinator habitat at home using native plants. The Zoo has also been conducting a biannual, in-person class for adults 21+ called Monarchs & Mimosas, every spring and fall for members of the community to attend to learn about monarch butterfly decline and how to develop a native plant monarch/pollinator habitat at home. Idlewild Butterfly Farm

This was the Louisville Zoo's 8th consecutive year for our event called 'FlutterFest', which celebrates the fall migration of the monarch butterfly. All of the programming took place at the Zoo. The Staff from Idlewild Butterfly Farm were stationed on our main plaza entrance and provided information about the natural history of the monarch butterfly. The Zoo also held their fall pollinator habitat class, Monarchs & Mimosas, which is a 21+ adult only class where participants learn about the AZA SAFE Monarch butterfly conservation program, the decline of the monarch butterfly along with the milkweed (*Asclepias* spp.) it requires, and how to develop a native pollinator habitat at home.

Each sign post contains 4 different signs: 1. The first sign at the top is the Zoo's monarch program sign with a QR code that links our dedicated monarch butterfly program webpage on the Zoo's website. 2. The second sign is Monarch Watch's Certified Monarch Waystation sign. 3. The third sign is for our native plant provider, Ironweed Native Plant Nursery. 4. The fourth sign is a management sign informing the reader that the leaves, plant stems, etc. are important for overwintering habitat and it is intentionally left that way. Each of our 11 community partners has this set of signage displayed at their habitat site on their property. And we have 3 of these sets of signs displayed here at the zoo, 1 at each of our pollinator habitat sites, and viewable by Zoo Guests.
