## Pledge Summary

Founded in 1778, the City of Louisville is the largest city in the Commonwealth of Kentucky and sits on the banks of the Ohio River sharing the border with Indiana. Now in our ninth year of monarch butterfly and pollinator conservation at the Louisville Zoo, Mayor Craig Greenberg is committed to continue uniting with over 600 fellow mayors across the U.S. in support of monarch butterfly and pollinator conservation by signing the National Wildlife Federation's "Mayor's Monarch Pledge". With the migratory monarch butterfly population declining by 85% over the last 20 years and again a candidate for listing as an endangered species under the U.S. Endangered Species Act, the iconic monarch butterfly has emerged as an ambassador species to raise awareness for all pollinators, their need for native plant habitat, and the vital ecosystem services they provide. Mayor Greenberg is dedicated to a healthy Louisville by supporting sustainable monarch conservation efforts through encouraging, educating, and empowering citizens that their efforts to create more pollinator habitat at home and throughout the community can have a lasting impact and further the Louisville Zoo's Mission "To Better the Bond Between People and Our Planet". Environmental Health = Human Health. The Louisville Zoo is a Louisville Metro Government agency, as well as an accredited member of the Association of Zoos & Aquariums (AZA). The Louisville Zoo has been a program partner for the AZA's Saving Animals From Extinction (S.A.F.E.) North American Monarch Butterfly Program since 2020.

## Action Items Committed for 2025

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. For our Residential program, habitat is being created by homeowners in their yards, raised beds, and potted plants. For our Community Partner Program, habitat has been created at schools & universities, TV stations, city/county public parks, public library, community garden center, culturally significant community center, and mental health/addiction treatment centers.

**How are you leveraging the Mayors' Monarch Pledge program to engage marginalized communities, such as low-income communities or communities of color?**

We are leveraging the Mayors' Monarch Pledge program to prioritize environmental equity by creating accessible, native plant monarch butterfly/pollinator friendly, demonstration habitat at culturally significant locations. This spring we partnered with the Muhammad Ali Center located in downtown Louisville.

**What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?**

The Louisville Zoo's Mission, "To better the bond between the people and the planet" has always been the driving force for this program and to participate in the Mayor's Monarch Pledge. Through the creation of native plant habitat at their home or organization, members of the community have an actual direct impact on the conservation of the monarch butterfly as well as thousands of other native plant, animal, and fungi species.

**What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?**

The resources in the Habitat Creation/Native Habitat folder on your website have been most helpful to give to guests/participants to assist them with the actual planning and development of a native pollinator habitat at their home or organization, and especially for how to manage their habitat long term for it to remain sustainable and ecologically productive.

**What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?**

We now have 13 community partners that we have created certified habitat at their organization property. Sites range from the local community in Kentucky and into Indiana, regionally, and now statewide with our plantings this year.

**Please describe the methods of public communication below (e.g., printed materials, social media, print media).**

This is the 5th consecutive year for the Zoo's Monarchs & Mimosas 21+ adult only class. The class lasts for 1.5 hours where class participants will learn about the role of AZA accredited Zoos and the SAFE North American Monarch Butterfly program, monarch butterfly natural history & conservation status, and how to select, design, and manage a native plant habitat at home. Participants receive a swamp milkweed plant as part of their registration fee and have early access to our native plant sale directly after the class has

ended. We had a combined total of 194 guests attend our two events. We also host a week long Zoo event called 'FlutterFest' that celebrates the fall migration of the monarch butterfly. This is our 9th continuous year for this event. We have numerous community partners that come and table each day through the week. We had a total of 11,380 guests attend this week. Our Zoo Monarchs & Mimosas event and native plant sale are a part of this week's events. A supplement to this program is the native butterfly exhibit that we have hosted continuously since 2017. This is a walk-through exhibit, open May - September, that allows all Zoo guests to be surrounded with up to 20 different species of butterflies that are native to Kentucky. We had a total of 95,948 guests go through the exhibit this year.

**Please describe your effort in completing this action.**

I'm the coordinator for this program and part of my role as coordinator is to visit each site, work with the community partner to choose an appropriate site, and then choose plants and design the planting based on the site's parameters: site size and possible surrounding area, soil moisture, soil type, hours of sun per day. At the site at the Muhammad Ali Center, we planted 70 plants = forbs and grasses including 5 Butterfly milkweed, *Asclepias tuberosa*. At the site at Camp Blanton, we planted 252 plants = forbs, grasses, sedges, vines, shrubs including 10 Common milkweed plants, *Asclepias syriaca*.

For 2025, we added two more Community Partners to our Louisville Zoo Monarchs & Milkweed Pollinator Habitat Project, the Muhammad Ali Center in Louisville, Ky. and the Kentucky Natural Lands Trust at Camp Blanton in Harlan Co., Ky. At both of these two sites, as well as our other 11 other Community Partners' sites, we display a set of 4 signs

on a signpost to display our programs information. The first sign at the top is our Louisville Zoo program sign with AZA and SAFE logos and a QR code that links to our dedicated webpage on the Zoo's website for this program. The second sign is the Monarch Watch Waystation Program sign. All sites are certified by Monarch Watch.

The fourth sign is a manage sign, Leave the Leaves, to inform the viewer that the site is intentionally left in it's natural untouched state through the winter to provide habitat for a diverse range of invertebrates, as well as amphibians, reptiles, birds, & mammals.
