## Pledge Summary

Town of Ossining is a predominantly residential community in Westchester County, New York. With six large parks, including one on the banks of the beautiful Hudson river, an organic community garden, passive trails and other natural assets, the Town is committed to protecting natural habitats, planting native species, reducing invasive plants and trees, and enhancing our natural resources. By taking the Mayor's Monarch Pledge we have committed to actively planting species that attract monarchs as well as other pollinators and support other policies and programs to educate and encourage these plantings throughout the Town.

After passing our monarch resolution (see uploads), we began systematically planting native species in all of our public spaces. The Town of Ossining also has a habitat stewards program in which invasive plants are removed from public areas and replaced with native, pollinator-friendly plant species. .

The Town of Ossining began a public communication effort to encourage the planting of monarch gardens in 2021 (see file uploads for sample communications). We continue to periodically share information about planting native gardens and amplify community members' efforts at same in the weekly Supervisor's Update and on our social media. We also maintain a list of native trees and plants for homeowners and developers to consult on our website. We have a tab on the website that allows for translation.
