## Action Items Committed for 2021

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.

### Systems Change

- Launch, expand, or continue an effort to change municipal planting ordinances and practices to include more native milkweed and native nectar producing plants at city properties.

The City partnered with the Xerces Society, Randall Davey Audubon Center, Santa Fe Watershed Association, the Santa Fe Public Schools, the Santa Fe Community College and 15+ local organizations working towards the preservation of pollinator habitats.

**Please describe the extent of engagement with these groups and revisions/maintenance implemented for mowing or planting programs.**

Together we developed a pollinator resource guide that we used to inform the community on things like not raking the leaves. Internally, city parks is working on planting a pollinator garden in the spring of 2022. A grant was received this year by our Keep Santa Fe Beautiful program to create a new pollinator garden that would include a bee sculpture made out of recycled materials and an education program around it.

### **How many plants were sold and/or given away at your event?**

As part of the 2021 Next Generation Water Summit, the City hosted a series of community events. The pollinator resource guide was distributed and free seeds were given out. Three local nurseries also participated and allowed the City to setup some signage that focused on pollinator friendly plants.

The City partnered with the Santa Fe Railyard Park to host a pollinator day event.
