Pledge Summary

The Village of Northbrook is a northern suburb of Chicago with a population of over 35,000. We are proud to be the home of some of the highest quality nature preserves in Illinois: Somme Preserves. Thanks to our volunteer ecological stewards who have been dedicated to natural restoration in our area since the 1970s, many rare plants and endangered animals nest or pass by our community during migratory periods. Through the Northbrook Climate Action Plan, the Village is committed to reducing community-wide carbon emissions and fostering environmental sustainability.

Action Items Committed for 2024

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. - Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.
- Plant milkweed and pollinator-friendly native nectar plants along roadsides, medians, or public rights-of-way.
- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.
- Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.

- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.

Systems Change

- Increase the percentage of native plants, shrubs and trees that must be used in city landscaping ordinances and encourage use of milkweed, where appropriate.
- Integrate monarch butterfly conservation into the city’s Park Master Plan, Sustainability Plan, Climate Resiliency Plan or other city plans.
- Reduce or eliminate the use of herbicides, pesticides, or other chemicals that are harmful to monarchs and pollinators and urban wildlife.
- Launch, expand, or continue one or more ordinances to reduce light pollution to benefit urban wildlife.

In 2024 from May 1 to June 1, the Village of Northbrook is suspending enforcement of the Municipal Code for excessive grass height and is encouraging all community members to participate in our "Slow Mow" initiative to voluntarily decrease mowing in support of wildlife. This may result in ground-cover exceeding the established ordinance height restrictions of eight inches, which is why enforcement is suspended for May for registered participants.

The Village collaborated with the Organic Gardener for our sustainable vegetable garden and ongoing hands-on educational workshops to promote earth-friendly food growing. The local groups like our Garden Club and Monarchs, Milkweed, and More collaborated to help find residents to participate in our virtual story map of pollinator habitat.

Continued enforcement program when property complaints are filed about invasive weeds growing in town. We also promote community volunteer opportunities for ecological restoration efforts that largely consist of invasive species removal. Worked with local groups, Monarchs Milkweed, and More, Sustainability Commission, Public Works to remove invasive species and buckthorn.

The Village now provides sustainability reviews to all new developments coming to Northbrook in need of zoning relief. Any applicable project with exterior lighting is required to comply with International Dark Sky standards for light fixtures to mitigate light pollution. These standards will be reflected in our updated Engineering Standards and Specifications for street and parking lighting as well. Additionally the Village has launched a voluntary Lights Out Northbrook campaign where community members commit to leaving their lights off after 11pm each night from now until November 15.

This is complete as of February 2023, with the start of the new landscape maintenance contract. While the state's Illinois Pesticide Act currently prohibits municipalities from regulating pesticide usage city-wide, the Village applies a sustainable pest management policy for all Village owned/ maintained greenspace. This requires robust reporting in the event that pesticides are used alongside diligent pest prevention practices.
