Pledge Summary

Reston is a planned community located in Fairfax County, Virginia with approximately 65,000 residents.. The community is located 20 miles west of Washington, DC and is renowned for its preservation of natural areas and commitment to environmental stewardship. Reston has been certified by NWF as a Community Wildlife Habitat. It is also a Tree City USA as designated by the National Arbor Day Foundation and a designated Biophilic City. Reston recognizes the plight of the Monarch species and endeavors to conserve habitat on Reston Association property, which is accessible to residents and visitors. Reston Association staff educate homeowners about monarch conservation efforts and provide resources for people to create butterfly habitats on their own properties and in their neighborhoods.

Action Items Committed for 2025

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.

- Initiate or support community science (or citizen science) efforts that help monitor monarch migration and health.

- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.
- Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.
- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.
- Earn or maintain recognition for being a wildlife-friendly city by participating in other wildlife and habitat conservation efforts (i.e., National Wildlife Federation’s Community Wildlife Habitat program).

Systems Change

- Integrate monarch butterfly conservation into the city’s Park Master Plan, Sustainability Plan, Climate Resiliency Plan or other city plans.
- Launch, expand, or continue one or more ordinances to reduce light pollution to benefit urban wildlife.

How are you leveraging the Mayors' Monarch Pledge program to engage marginalized communities, such as low-income communities or communities of color?

All programs and volunteer opportunities, including those related to monarch conservation, are open and accessible to our diverse Reston community. 1,300 acres of open space are equitably distributed throughout the community as per our Master Plan. 55 miles of pathways and trails connect people to nature and are heavily used. Partnership with the Friends of Reston help to provide some free programs as well as scholarships.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

Reston has been known for its environmental stewardship and education since its inception in the 1960's. This program is a natural fit for us. We have many residents and staff concerned about Monarchs, native plants and pollinators, who are motivated to help as they can.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

We hope to be more active in the community calls in 2026. We have our annual Spring Festival on Saturday, May 2, and would love to have a representative from your team there to table on Monarch Conservation.

Wildlife programs in Reston pursue a dual objective of cultivating wildlife appreciation across all age groups and promoting sustained involvement through citizen science initiatives. We work hard to encourage visitors and participants to consider becoming involved as their next step in learning, through volunteering in events like invasive plant pulls, wildlife counts and native plantings. Also, through our volunteer plantings and native plant sales, we facilitated the planting of over 1,850 native plants in our community.

Each year since 1994, Reston Association has hosted the Annual Reston Butterfly Count, engaging volunteers to search for butterflies throughout Reston's 1,300 acres of open space. Since 2010, our count circle has been registered with the North American Butterfly Association, and data has been shared with NABA for its Fourth of July Butterfly Count Report (<https://naba.org/butterfly-counts/>). Our 2026 count was held on July 5. 168 butterflies of 19 species were observed, including 3 Monarchs.
