The City of Westland has established a vision called "Mission Green" which focuses on educating residents the importance of environmental sustainability. The community actively participates in conservation projects, including the installation and maintenance of butterfly gardens. Community volunteers play a crucial role in educating residents about the significance of monarch butterflies and pollinator conservation. Westland has established a butterfly garden at Corrado Park that is maintained by community volunteers known as the Birds, Butterflies and Bees Community Gardening Group. This group organizes educational programs and initiatives to raise awareness about the importance of pollinator conservation. This garden provides essential habitats and food sources for monarchs and other pollinators. Westland's commitment to monarch and pollinator conservation demonstrates the dedication to environmental stewardship and creating a sustainable community for both present and future generations.
