Peekskill is a city of 25,000 located in Westchester County, New York, along the Hudson River. The City is bordered by beautiful Blue Mountain Park to the South and Bear Mountain to the North as well as several local parks and the Peekskill Regeneration Farm. Mayor McKenzie of Peekskill, NY has committed to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators with her signing of the Mayor's Monarch Pledge, and looks forward to engaging residents as Peekskill fulfills the actions of this pledge.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

The community is interested in supporting pollinators and converting lawns into gardens that will support the ecosystem, including Monarchs.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

More resources are always needed in a city such as Peekskill. Money for educational signage and materials, and planting materials (compost, soil, containers, planting markers, border markers) would help us to expand the program. Also, funding for marketing the initiative to private property owners would yield additional acreage.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

Over the past year, monarch butterfly conservation in Peekskill has grown into a community-wide effort. Residents have actively participated by planting milkweed in their own yards and displaying educational signage, extending habitat beyond public spaces and into neighborhoods throughout the city. This work has been highly collaborative,

bringing together City staff, volunteers, and residents around a shared commitment to supporting monarch populations and strengthening local pollinator habitat.
