Pledge Summary

The City of Fort Collins sits nestled against the foothills of the Rocky Mountains alongside the banks of the Cache La Poudre River, and is known to host a diversity of butterflies and pollinators. The many Natural Areas and Parks in Fort Collins provide habitat for Monarch butterflies and other pollinators. In addition, the Nature in the City program encourages habitat linkages throughout the city on non-city lands. With these programs in place, Mayor Wade Troxell commits to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators by signing of the Mayor's Monarch Pledge and looks forward to engaging the community in building more pollinator habitat throughout Fort Collins.

Action Items Committed for 2021

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. - Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.

We recognize the value pollinators bring to the urban ecosystem and want to ensure that they can thrive in Fort Collins as the city grows and we face the climate crisis.

We need more resources in, English and Spanish, on how to engage and train the landscaping industry to properly design, install, and maintain native habitats.

We met with representatives from other Cities at the end of this year to talk more about the efforts each of us are taking to help pollinators. We are planning on starting a quarterly meeting to discuss how we can better share resources and lessons learned as well all move forward in this conservation initiative.

Each day during Pollinator Week, a different pollinator species is highlighted along with which plants the community can plant to support that species. We also sponsored a local landscaping workshop and sent a flyer to every participant encouraging them to plant for pollinators (see attached flyer).

The Natural Areas Department is doing a grassland restoration at Bobcat Ridge Natural Area to remove invasive smooth brome and restore native grassland species to support greater ecosystem functioning and wildlife. Herbicides were applied to kill smooth brome and mowing has been done to control the annual weeds emerging. The area will be seeded with natives multiple times.
