As Yonkers has experienced significant population growth and new development, the City is committed to preserving and protecting green space and pollinator habitat. The Mayor's Monarch Pledge helps to raise public awareness of the importance of our efforts and encourage participation from our communities.

**What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?**

Public outreach toolkits are helpful in developing messaging to reach our communities. County and State Transportation departments maintain many of the rights-of-way in New York, especially the green spaces surrounding highway ramps which often support large areas of milkweed, but which are often mowed down by crews. These agencies should

engaged in preserving monarch habitat at these locations. Recommendations for legislative measures to help protect and expand monarch habitat would be helpful.

**What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?**

The City of Yonkers received good press and public response to the 9 new monarch habitat preservation sites established citywide. The City plans to establish additional preservation sites in 2022 and is exploring additional legislative action to protect monarch habitat.
