Pledge Summary

The City of Mansfield is located in the Dallas-Fort Worth Metroplex area with a population of roughly 74,000. We have multiple native plant gardens throughout the city as well as a nature park. We want to continue to make the city more pollinator friendly with native plants, new pollinator gardens, and mowing practices. We are committed to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators by engaging and educating residents of their importance.

Action Items Committed for 2021

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)
- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.
- Engage with gardening leaders and partners (e.g., Master Naturalists, Master Gardeners, Nature Centers, Native Plant Society Chapters , other long-standing and influential community leaders) to support monarch butterfly conservation.
- Create a community-driven educational conservation strategy, initiative, or practice that focuses on and benefits local, underserved residents.
- Create a community art project to enhance and promote monarch and pollinator conservation as well as cultural awareness and recognition.

- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.

- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.
- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.

Mansfield Garden Club works throughout the city with many different employees to help keep out gardens native and maintained. Encourage Garden Club to replace plants in demo gardens at Service Center, library, and rec center with only natives and adaptive with an emphasis on pollinator plants; water utilities and environmental services provides funds for plant purchases and maintenance by Garden Club Residents who participated in selected gardening classes were eligible for free plants (herbs and veggies) that we distributed from the service center and library Lead plant tour at ONP during the Monarch Festival 2021; provided participants with guides and also placed educational signage around parks for festival goers to continue learn as they walked the park Currently working with Garden Club to redo the plant information labels in the service center demo gardens. These labels will include info about pollinators as related to each appropriate plant.

City staff worked to change their mowing schedule to mow later in the fall to help the bees. There were no outside groups that helped with this.
