Monarch life cycle, selection of plants, maintaining nectar and host plants in garden
Monarch Festival - hosted a booth with pollinator plant craft, butterfly house, games & crafts
100 Hours of Play - hosted a booth with butterfly craft, discussed butterfly life cycle

Discussed the need for milkweed with Garden Club Members who then added plants at the Service Center Demo garden; I wrote a Keep Texas Beautiful Green Bag grant to secure funding for installing butterfly gardens on selected MISD campuses, then worked with teachers and students on those campuses to understand the need for milkweed as a host plant and how to plant and maintain it. I purchased milkweed using the grant funds, then teachers monitored students in planting and maintaining.
