## Pledge Summary

Decatur GA is an urban city in the Atlanta metro region with a population of around 27,000 people in 4.5 sq mi. There are several community gardens in Decatur, including two on city-owned property. We are a Tree City USA and a Tree City of the World. Decatur was recognized as the first BeeCity in Georgia in July 2016 and has established two bee habitat gardens. Signing the Mayor's Monarch Pledge is another opportunity for the city to commit to additional conservation efforts and is supported by the city's Active Living Board and the Environmental Sustainability Board. We look forward to continuing our work to educate the community about strategies to conserve monarchs and to taking steps to establish additional natural habitats for monarch butterflies.

## Action Items Committed for 2021

### Communications and Convening

1. Manual & Mechanical Removal- Many NNIS can be removed via handpulling (manual) and/or the use of hand tools (mechanical) to extract them from the soil. While this can be quite effective, it generally will require repeated actions in the same management area and is never a “one and done” scenario. This method can sometimes be used in combination with other methods such as chemical treatment or native plantings. Manual control is the best action when utilizing volunteer help, as little or no prior experience or specialized training is necessary. It is important to note, however, that manual control can sometimes result in extensive soil disturbance which can encourage germination of NNIS seeds and could result in erosion or siltation issues. For these reasons, manual control is not always the most appropriate action. Digging large holes in the ground to remove mature Chinese privet, for instance, can be counterproductive in the amount of time and man-power it takes and the resulting soil disturbance and large holes created which are an open invitation for new (and sometimes worse) NNIS to take root and flourish. If chemical treatment is deemed necessary, a herbicide with the highest effectiveness and the lowest environmental impact should be considered. For large woody NNIS (shrubs, trees and large vines) over 3/4” diameter, cutting and stump treating is the preferred control action. Currently, use of a glyphosatebased herbicide without added surfactant (marketed as “Rodeo” or “Aquamaster”) appears to be the preferred chemical treatment for cut and treat. This product appears to have the lowest toxicity with the highest confidence rating and to be less harmful environmentally than some commonly-available products based on glyphosate.
