Covington is located in Northern Kentucky directly across the river from Cincinnati. Covington has just over 40,000 residents and is home to the beautiful 700 acre Devou Park that features prairies and pollinator gardens throughout. We also have a number of pollinator gardens in parks throughout our city. In 2017, Mayor Joseph Meyer signed a proclamation for the city to join the Mayor's Monarch Pledge. Since then we have installed numerous gardens and formed a community monarch coalition that helps us carry out chosen action items. Mayor Joseph Meyer continues to support this effort by repledging in 2024.

Working with residents and local organizations, we have created opportunities for residents in that area to engage and learn about nature and pollinator gardens. These efforts aim to connect environmental stewardship with community pride and engagement.

Our community is motivated by a desire to protect monarchs and enhance our local environment for future generations. The pledge has brought us together with a formal structure to make a positive impact on our ecosystem.

Where is the demonstration garden located and how does this location relate to the cultural significance of the monarch (if relevant)? (Please provide an address or coordinates, if possible)

We planted a new demonstration garden that is located at the newly redeveloped Austinburg Neighborhood Park in Covington, KY (502-16 E 15th St, Covington, KY 41014). This park was chosen due to its prominent role in the community as a revitalized space that promotes outdoor activities and neighborhood gatherings. The location's redevelopment reflects the importance of transformation and renewal, which aligns with the monarch butterfly's journey. This new garden serves as a connection for the community to engage with nature and foster an appreciation for pollinators.

To complete this effort, we worked and partnered with local community organizations such as the Center for Great Neighborhoods, Covington Parks and Recreation, and volunteer groups like Fidelity.

Each group had a voice in discussions about revising maintenance and planting programs, to ensure that each group was utilized in ways that best supported the mission. The City of Covington Public Works and Urban Forestry teams managed mowing and general maintenance surrounding the pollinator gardens. Covington Parks and Recreation, along with Solid Waste and Recycling, focused on the intricate work within the gardens, such as ensuring their health, removing invasive plants, and maintaining adherence to pollinator waystation qualifications. Keep Covington Beautiful and The Center for Great Neighborhoods provided additional support by coordinating programming and volunteer efforts to enhance the gardens and expand community involvement.
