## Pledge Summary

The Town of DeWitt sits in the heart of New York State between the Finger Lakes, the Adirondacks, Lake Ontario and the St. Lawrence River. Bordered by the City of Syracuse in the west and the Town of Manlius in the east, it has been a desirable suburban community for more than 185 years. If parks, trails, and greenspaces are “natural capital,” DeWitt enjoys a wealth of beautiful, natural spaces. Several parks, a robust trail system, greenspaces and access to the Erie Canalway and the Empire State Trail are all available within the Town of DeWitt. Ryder Park, one of the most popular in DeWitt, has been home to the town’s butterfly garden for over 20 years. Town Supervisor, Ed Michalenko has committed to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators with his signing of the Mayor’s Monarch Pledge and looks forward to partnering with the Recreation Department and DeWitt Advisory Conservation Commission to engage residents in building more pollinator habitat throughout the town.

Members of these organizations helped develop a plan to revitalize the Town's butterfly garden located adjacent to the DeWitt Town Hall. They developed a map of current plants in the garden and a timeline for the overall project; Spring 2021: Clean up dead debris and reinstall rocks lining the walkway. Identify what is still growing and what needs to be removed. Remove invasive exotic plants and aggressive native plants. Fall 2021: Plant any additional plants that may be necessary in the open areas. They also participated in a clean-up event on May 15, 2021.
