Pledge Summary

The City of Greenbelt is a municipality of approximately 23,000 people located just outside of Washington D.C. in Prince George's County, Maryland. The City has actively pursued opportunities to support and maintain pollinators and pollinator habitat over the years. Greenbelt has recently been certified as a Bee City USA affiliate with the Xerces Society and has taken steps to improve and create new pollinator habitat. Mayor Jordan of Greenbelt will be looking to continue with these endeavors in the year to come.

Action Items Committed for 2022

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.
- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.
- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.

The City of Greenbelt is fully committed to the preservation of pollinators and pollinator habitat. We have additional commitments as a Bee City USA affiliate and regularly work to maintain pollinator habitat in areas such as our Firefly Sanctuary.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

As a Bee City USA Affiliate, the Xerces Society has been invaluable as a resource. More pollinator based grant opportunities would be helpful to meet our goals. Most grants focus on tree plantings and not on native perennial/meadow planting. By creating more funding

opportunities for these kinds of projects it would be easier to assess and cultivate more turf grass areas into pollinator habitat.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

We have continued to support pollinator health and conservation as a Bee City USA affiliate and will continue to make improvements each year.

The City of Greenbelt, in conjunction with nearby Bee City USA affiliate municipalities, observed "No Mow Month" for the month of April, encouraging residents to forego mowing that month to aid in early pollinator habitat. Residents could register to have a yard sign declaring they were participating and the City suspended mowing and lawn care ordinances for that month. HOA's and other community organizations were asked to participate as well. The City looks forward to continuing and broadening this effort next year.

Where is the demonstration garden located and how does this location relate to the cultural significance of the monarch (if relevant)? (Please provide an address or coordinates, if possible)

The demonstration garden (Buddy Attick Food Forest) is located at the main entrance to Buddy Attick park in the center of the City of Greenbelt (555 Crescent Road, Greenbelt, MD 20770). This park is frequented by thousands of visitors each year and with the addition of native plants and milkweeds, the food forest will provide more food sources to pollinators including the monarch.

What community organizations, groups, or leaders (if any) did you partner with or engage to complete this effort?

The City worked with numerous community organizations as part of its Earth Day Celebration. This included the Dora Kennedy French Immersion School, the non-profit CHEARS, GHI, Scouts of America, and Eleanor Roosevelt High School. The plants

purchased for this event were funded by the state of Maryland through the Keep Maryland Beautiful Grant.
