## Pledge Summary

The City of Greenbelt is located in Northern Prince George's County, Maryland with a population of roughly 24,000. As a Bee City USA affiliate, Greenbelt is committed to the conservation of our native pollinators and spreading awareness about the challenges they face. This includes the iconic monarch butterfly. By creating habitat gardens, yearly milkweed giveaways, and promoting ecologically conscious gardening practices, Greenbelt will continue to support the monarch and pollinators of all persuasions. This pledge stands as a testament to that commitment.

## Action Items Committed for 2023

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Plant milkweed and pollinator-friendly native nectar plants along roadsides, medians, or public rights-of-way.
- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.
- Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.

### Systems Change

- Change weed or mowing ordinances to allow for native prairie and plant habitats.

The City of Greenbelt is fully committed to the preservation of pollinators and pollinator habitat. We have additional commitments as a Bee City USA affiliate and regularly work to maintain pollinator habitat in areas such as our Firefly Sanctuary.

**What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?**

As a Bee City USA Affiliate, the Xerces Society has been invaluable as a resource. More pollinator based grant opportunities would be helpful to meet our goals. Most grants focus on tree plantings and not on native perennial/meadow planting. By creating more funding opportunities for these kinds of projects it would be easier to assess and cultivate more turf grass areas into pollinator habitat.

**What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?**

We have continued to support pollinator health and conservation as a Bee City USA affiliate and will continue to make improvements each year.

The City of Greenbelt works closely with the Greenbelt Community Garden Club and the CHEARS Three Sisters Gardens in town. Staff have gone to the garden sites to provide insight on how to create more pollinator friendly habitats in conjunction with vegetables and the benefits of doing so. A girl scout also completed her silver award project by installing a new insect hotel near the Schrom Hills Three Sisters Community Garden.

The Department of Public Works has been working hard to provide native nectar plants and milkweeds to residence. Every year the department will provide native plugs including butterfly weed and swamp milkweed at the City's Farmers Market during National Pollinator Week. The City has also participated in No Mow Month during the month of April for the past two years to boost early spring pollinator habitat. Currently the Pollinator Circle, a volunteer advisory group is working on further mowing practice recommendations to present to council and the Department of Public Works.

This is ongoing with the Department of Public Works. The staff liaison for the pollinator circle is a DPW employee who maintains communications between the advisory group and the department.

The City of Greenbelt engages with community volunteers to remove invasive species throughout the city. The Department of Public Works averages 10-15 invasive species removal events per year and often accompanies them with native plant installations. The

most recent event saw 10 volunteers work to remove over 6 cubic yards of invasive bush honeysuckle and install over 20 native understory shrub and tree species.
