Pledge Summary

Southwest Ranches is a semi-rural community in western Broward County with a population of under 8,000. Southwest Ranches is home to 150 acres of preserved park land, including 3 properties for which the County has bestowed Emerald awards for our stewardship of wildlife habitat. Southwest Ranches residents receive monthly information regarding the importance of conservation for pollinators, and have multiple public properties upon which best management practices are demonstrated. Additionally, southwest Ranches works closely with Broward County doing outreach regarding habitat creation and preservation.

Action Items Committed for 2026

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.

Improvement of Town properties that have become or are becoming invaded by invasive exotic plant species. Approximately 15 acres across four different sites were included for removal of invasive exotics that have proliferated on shared fencelines, or on portions of Town properties that have not benefitted from development or maintenance. In some cases, overgrowth on neighboring properties contributes to the proliferation on Town sites. Removal was accomplished by cutting trees and removal of overgrown invasive exotic vegetation by mechanical means
