Pledge Summary

Established in 1984, the City of Rochester Hills, in Southeast Michigan, has a population of roughly 75,000. Rochester Hills is committed to sustaining its position among the nation's preeminent places to live, work and raise a family. The community continues to value its natural resources and green spaces. The City sees the importance of not only protecting and enhancing these resources; but acting as a leader and model to residents and the community. As part of this effort, the city is committed to taking actions to conserve and maintain pollinator habitats. Actions include supporting local native plants sales, seed collection programs, providing pollinator habitat support to HOA's and residents, and continued stewardship efforts in our City Parks and Green Spaces.

Action Items Committed for 2023

This Pledge continues to drive our use of partnering with local non-profits, like the Clinton River Watershed Council, to provide outreach to our entire community about pollinators and native Plants. The Gardens maintained will be visited at our Bloomer Park by our youth camps, which include sponsored kids from low income families. Additionally, our invasives program provide cost effective resources to have invasive species treated in our community.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

The City values its natural resources, green spaces, and the wildlife that relies on them. We see the importance of not only protecting and enhancing these resources; but acting as

a leader and model to residents and the community. The Mayors Monarch Pledge is a great program to accompany with our Tree City USA designation. We have active Garden clubs and residents that show interest in enhancing our pollinator habitat in our community and in our neighboring communities.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

Webinars and have had conversations with the neighboring community that also participates to discuss actions and future plans. Regular social media content would be helpful that we could post or share.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

Numbers provided above do not include the tens of thousands of people (kids and adults) that visit Innovation Hills, the Museum, and Bloomer Park that are exposed to the pollinator gardens in these locations. We also have held several events; like our OAK in the Hills event, which had over 1000 participants, that have components promoting pollinator efforts. We continue provide outreach on social media and in a monthly E-Newsletter regarding invasive species, national pollinators week, and general environmental stewardship. We have started conversations with local residents that have particular interest in this program and we created a resident group to help future efforts that met multiple times. in the last year.

The Clinton River Watershed Council partners with us every year to host a Native Seed Collection workshop and collection day at our Avon Nature Area. Avon Nature Area is on our City Hall property and has a prairie that we established and continue to maintain annually (prescribed burns, planting, etc.) to have a high quality native prairie for pollinator species. CRWC takes lead on this program and we help support with the site and promotion.

Please describe the extent of revisions or maintenance to invasive species removal programs, as well as the practices or techniques used to remove the invasive plants.

Several location within our Green Spaces / Parks are maintained as Native Prairies / wet meadows with annual invasive species treatment/removals to promote native forbs and vegetation. In the past year, we also completed forestry mowing on 2 acres of areas inundated with woody invasives, such as buckthorn, to reestablish meadows that we ultimately be restored to habitat that will support pollinators, like Monarchs. Treatments beyond forestry mowing, include prescribed burns, herbicide treatments, volunteer pulls, etc. The City offers a city wide Phragmites program to residents and HOA's to encourage and assist them in removal of invasives on their private properties. We had over 25 HOA's participate this year.

in 2022/2023 our PNR 5-year Master Plan and our 10 year PNR strategic plan was completed. As part of these plans goals and objectives were established. Plans specifically call out enhancing city properties by removing non-native/invasives. It also includes expanding Green Space properties through land acquisition. They also include developing Citizen led programs and volunteer engagement. Staff is in progress of incorporating Monarch butterfly and pollinator conservation into these established goals/recommendations. For example; one recommendation was to develop a systematic volunteer management and engagement system. This directly correlates with our desire to build partnerships with volunteers and local garden clubs to establish and maintain monarch habitat. Staff will utilize these recommendations and goals to pursue department policies and engaging other departments on monarch related efforts. This is still a work in progress.
