Albuquerque is the largest city in New Mexico. Its varied landscape, from the banks of the Rio Grande to Chihuahuan desert mesas and the foothills of the Sandia Mountains, supports diverse wildlife communities. Our city is home to many endemic and migratory species, including a diversity of butterflies and other pollinators. Mayor Keller is committed to advancing Albuquerque as a leader in resilient, equitable and long-term environmental solutions, and he pledges to raise awareness and community support for the conservation of monarchs and other pollinators. A hive mind of leaders from the ABQ BioPark and other community stakeholders will build upon existing education and engagement programs to advocate for pollinator protection.

How are you leveraging the Mayors' Monarch Pledge program to engage marginalized communities, such as low-income communities or communities of color?

Tingley Beach is a city owned free public park managed by the ABQ BioPark, in which a pollinator garden was installed with associated interpretive signage. The interpretive signage copy is in both Spanish and English.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

The ABQ BioPark is the number one visited cultural attraction in New Mexico with over 1 million visitors annually. Furthermore, the ABQ BioPark's mission is to foster meaningful connections between people and nature. Additionally, the ABQ BioPark vision is to envision a future where communities are connected to nature and committed to its protection. By having the City of Albuquerque signing onto the National Wildlife Federation's Mayors Monarch Pledge, guests are able to better understand the importance of pollinators and subsequently help protect them for future generations. In addition, constituents urged the City of Albuquerque to continue its commitment to the Mayor's Monarch Pledge.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

The guide, "Grounding Habitat Work in Environmental Justice, Equity, and Inclusion: A Guide for Communities" has been particularly useful as the City of Albuquerque expands its strategies for increasing equity and inclusion at community-based events taking place at various cultural institutions across the City of Albuquerque.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

The New Mexico BioPark Society's Species Survival Officer for Invertebrates Pollinators, Quinn Bane, has continued the collaborative work on the endangered Sacramento Mountain Checkerspot, an endemic New Mexico species. The effort was reported on by numerous large media outlets around the globe, including the New York Times, among others. Additionally, the ABQ BioPark Entomology Department in cooperation with the US Fish and Wildlife Service have been participating in the captive rearing of the Sacramento Mountain Checkerspot Butterfly, which currently habitats in designated Critical Habitat of the Sacramento Mountains. By proxy, this work brings greater awareness to the efforts being made in regards to monarch butterfly conservation efforts.

ABQ BioPark has continued its partnership with Jackalope (local retail store) to have several pollinator displays throughout the Botanic Garden and Zoo with associated QR codes with pollinator information, to include the importance of pollinators, nighttime pollinators, how to install a pollinator garden, beneficial insects, and beneficial pollinator plants to install in a pollinator garden. Similar signs are installed at Tingley Beach, a free public park with an associated pollinator garden. In addition, educational signs are located in the ABQ BioPark Botanic Garden's "Power of Pollinators" Butterfly Pavilion explaining the various types of pollinators, the importance of pollinators, and what one can do at home to support pollinators.

The wildflower project has the following guiding principles: To continue to make Burque a bee friendly city, reduce the amount of water needed for median maintenance, and reduce the amount of herbicide needed for weed control.
