Pledge Summary

Moon Township is a suburb of Pittsburgh in Western Pennsylvania. The Township is home to a population of approximately 25,000 people. Moon Township has a long-standing tradition of investment in public parks and open space. The Township has three landmark parks that feature over 600 acres of open space and over 15 miles of hiking trails. In 2019 the Township converted open areas in both Robin Hill Park and Moon Park into no-mow wildflower meadows. The meadows have been planted with special blends of native flowers and grasses specifically for pollinators. The Township also participates in the Pollinator Pathway program developing community Pollinator Pathways through volunteer efforts working together to establish pollinator-friendly habitats. In addition to the Pollinator Pathways, the Township also participates in the Wildlife-Friendly Community program with the National Wildlife Federation to create a wildlife habitat throughout the community while educating and engaging residents. Moon Township residents have certified their own gardens and yards assisting the Township in reaching the certification goal.

Action Items Committed for 2024

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.

The Township has created habitat in two (2) of our public parks, Robin Hill Park and Moon Park. The Township Public Works Department continues to maintain each meadow habitat annually. The Township also participates in the Community Wildlife Habitat program where we encourage our residents annually to certify their habitats. The Township also partnered this year with the Garden Club and the Environmental Advisory Council for habitat planting at our Mooncrest Activity Center.

How are you leveraging the Mayors' Monarch Pledge program to engage marginalized communities, such as low-income communities or communities of color?

This year the Township partnered with Mooncrest Neighborhood Programs a program of Hopebound Ministries and the Felician Sister to plan a community pollinator garden at the Sr. Rene Procopio Activity Center, property owned and maintained by the Township. The Township leveraged the principles of the Monarch Pledge to enhance awareness of the importance of pollinators, engage students in the process of planting, and illustrate the

need to plant natives and fruit bearing trees in the region. The Township plans to continue this planning in the future.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

The Township took the Monarch Pledge and continues to take the Monarch Pledge to demonstrate that we are committed to creating a habitat for the monarch butterfly but that we are also committed to planting pollinators in our public spaces, creating education about the importance of planting and the environment, and to demonstrate that we're committing to national programs established on best practices for environmental stewardship.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

As this is my first year personally through the program, I have yet to really utilize the resources of the Monarch Pledge however I intend to more frequently next year.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

Nothing else at this time. We continue to work to fulfill our community action items and intend to renew our commitment to the program for 2025.

In May of 2024 Moon Township partnered with the Moon Township Garden Club, the Moon Township Environmental Advisory Council, Hollow Oak Land Trust, and Rosela Farms to host a plant seed swap/giveaway at Moon Park.

Where is the demonstration garden located and how does this location relate to the cultural significance of the monarch (if relevant)? (Please provide an address or coordinates, if possible)

The Township has two demonstration gardens one located at Robin Hill Park (949 Thorn Run Road) and the other located in Moon Park (1340 Joe DeNardo Way). Both locations are public parks accessible to all who wish to visit. The concept for the demonstration gardens was born out of the initiatives of the Township's Green Team and the Environmental Advisory Council.

What community organizations, groups, or leaders (if any) did you partner with or engage to complete this effort?

The Township partnered with the Green Initiatives team, the Environmental Advisory Council, the Parks and Recreation Department and the Public Works Department to create and plant the gardens. The plants came from a local nursery and the Public Works Department continues to maintain the gardens.
