Pledge Summary

Moon Township is a suburb of Pittsburgh in Western Pennsylvania. The Township is home to a population of approximately 27,000 people. Moon Township has a long standing tradition of investment in public parks and open space. The Township has three landmark parks that feature over 600 acres of open space and over 15 miles of hiking trails. In 2019 the Township began converting open areas of both Robin Hill Park and Moon Park into no-mow wildflower meadows. These meadows have been planted with a special blend of native wildflowers and grasses specifically for pollinators. The Township continues to work to expand our native and pollinator plantings in our public spaces annually reviewing addition opportunities for plantings.

Action Items Committed for 2025

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.
- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.
- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.

Systems Change

- Integrate monarch butterfly conservation into the city's Park Master Plan, Sustainability Plan, Climate Resiliency Plan or other city plans.

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.
- Engage with developers, planners, landscape architects, and other community leaders and organizers engaged in planning processes to identify opportunities to create monarch habitat.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

The Township of Moon is committed to environmental stewardship and fostering a community where the importance of the monarch butterfly is recognized on an annual basis. By taking the pledge, the Township elevates a concern into meaningful action. Local government plays a critical role in conservation. By participating in the pledge, the Township makes a commitment to restoring habitats, reducing pesticide impacts, and educating residents about pollinator health. The pledge provided a structured framework that helps us transform our intentions into concrete initiatives. The Township continues to participate in Mayors' Monarch Pledge program because we have seen real results as part of the program. The Township has built a greater connection with local developers and community groups promoting the importance of pollinators, monarch habitats, and the use of native plants. Each year, the pledge helps us build momentum, set new goals, and strengthen a culture of conservation within the community.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

Technical guidance distributed as part of the monthly Mayors' Monarch Pledge Newsletter has been the most helpful thus far. Things like the Community-Based Funding Guidance document, news highlights, and funding opportunities have helped to support Township initiatives. I would like to see more webinars offered throughout the year highlighting programs and processes from other municipalities that participate in the pledge.

Where is your habitat being created? This may include residences (yards, containers, balconies, etc.), schools, places of worship, rights-of-way, roadsides, community gardens, culturally-significant locations, shared public spaces and common areas or parks.

The Township participates in the Pollinator Pathway program, where we encourage residents and businesses to plant as they are able. The Township has both commercial spaces and residential areas registered as part of the pathway program. The Township also has two (2) meadows located within municipal parks. Signage for the meadows was installed earlier this year. In June of this year the Environmental Advisory Council planted native plants consisting of little bluestem, sweet goldenrod, aromatic aster, coneflowers, and butterfly milkweed at Olson Park, a Township park offering disc golf, open passive space, and play equipment.

How are you leveraging the Mayors' Monarch Pledge program to engage marginalized communities, such as low-income communities or communities of color?

In partnering with the Garden Club for the annual seed swap the Township offers free milkweed plugs to all attendees. There is no fee to attend the seed swap, and the swap is held at a local municipal park accessible to all who wish to attend.

The Township is currently in the process of updating both our Comprehensive Plan and our Parks and Recreation Plan. Both plans are currently in the public outreach process with the Parks and Recreation plan expected to be completed by next summer and the Comprehensive Plan completed by next fall. Both of these plans will discuss the importance of conservation areas, monarch habitats, and native planting.

Over the past year, the Township has increased efforts to communicate with developers, and landscape architects to discuss the importance of utilizing native plantings and increasing monarch habitats. In the early stages of development, the Township meets with the developer to discuss landscaping and the importance of sourcing local plants. The Township is also in the process of updating our Comprehensive Plan and our Parks and Recreation Master Plan. We are working with the consulting teams to identify areas in the Township that can be bolstered by native plantings and where we can create additional monarch plantings. The Township will also be working with our Mooncrest Neighborhood Programs to increase monarch habitats and create a food forest.

Please describe your effort in completing this action.

On July 17th with shovels in hand, the EAC took to Olson Park to plant little bluestem, a ornamental bunchgrass; sweet goldenrod, a smooth, tall fragrant plant bearing clusters of yellow flower heads; aromatic aster, a fall blooming lavender-blue or purple plant with stems that will branch out slowly to create a bush-like appearance; coneflowers named for the spiny cone-shaped flower center encircled by slender petals; and butterfly milkweed named for the butterflies it attracts to the plant by its color and nectar produced. Each plant was specifically identified due to its benefits to wildlife, adaptability to local climate, soil, and precipitation patterns. The inclusion of the butterfly milkweed specifically supports the Mayors Monarch Pledge a pledge taken annually by the Board of Supervisors to support and expand the monarch butterfly population. Final mulching of the plant bed took place on July 20th.
