Pledge Summary

Carrboro is a progressive, vibrant community located in the Piedmont region of central North Carolina. Over 20,000 diverse residents call Carrboro home. In 2014, the Town of Carrboro stated its intention to promote healthy, sustainable habitats for pollinators by becoming the third municipality in the country to join the Bee City USA initiative. The Town recognizes the importance of avoiding and minimizing impacts of municipal operations on pollinators and other species, has been working to support and protect environmental features for over 40 years, and has been pursuing a Least Toxic Integrated Pest Management Policy since the 1990s. The Town has also committed to protecting and enhancing native ecosystems through its 2017 Community Climate Action Plan. Mayor Damon Seils has signed the Mayors' Monarch Pledge to reaffirm the Town's commitment to the environment and engage residents in creating and enhancing pollinator habitat throughout the community.

Action Items Committed for 2022

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.
- Plant milkweed and pollinator-friendly native nectar plants along roadsides, medians, or public rights-of-way.
- Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.

Systems Change

- Change weed or mowing ordinances to allow for native prairie and plant habitats.
- Launch, expand, or continue an effort to change municipal planting ordinances and practices to include more native milkweed and native nectar producing plants at city properties.

Webinars and links to native plant resources have been very helpful. Pollinator gardening toolkits and plans are very useful to staff for outreach events and for use by community members.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

Town staff participated in an outreach event at the Carrboro Farmers' Market in August 2022 to promote pollinator conservation. Staff gave away packets of native wildflower seeds to 50 attendees. Members of a Town Advisory Board, the Climate Action Team, also held pollinator garden tours in June 2022 to celebrate National Pollinator Week.

Please describe the extent of revisions or maintenance to invasive species removal programs, as well as the practices or techniques used to remove the invasive plants.

Staff routinely work to plan volunteer invasive species removal events on Town property, as recommended by the Town's Community Climate Action Plan: <http://townofcarrboro.org/DocumentCenter/View/8961/Community-Climate-Action-Plan---Updated-Oct-2020>. Staff held several events to remove invasive species with volunteers in Town parks in 2022. Multiple events were held in Wilson Park to remove invasive wisteria and privet using hand tools. During a separate event, an Eagle Scout tree planting project in Henry "Hank" Anderson III Park, invasive species were hand-pulled from a riparian restoration area during the tree planting. Staff also held an educational outreach presentation about invasive species with the help of several volunteers. Staff are also working to finalize the details of a program to allow volunteers to work independently and remove invasive species on Town property without staff presence.

Town crews installed a new rain garden at Town Hall in November 2022 (Address: 301 W Main St Carrboro, NC 27510). The plant material chosen are North Carolina native species that are pollinator and wildlife friendly. Staff planted butterfly milkweed plants in Henry "Hank" Anderson III Park in 2022 in a riparian restoration area next to a parking lot. (Address: 302 N Carolina Hwy 54 W, Chapel Hill, NC 27516). Staff and advisory board volunteers maintain a pollinator garden located at the intersection of Hillsborough Rd and W Main St (35.913607, -79.079374) along a roadside. In fall 2022, staff planted butterfly milkweed seeds in this pollinator garden.

Staff planted the milkweed in June 2022 and watered them throughout the summer in order to insure their survival during the hottest and driest months.

Town Public Works staff currently make an effort to use native, pollinator-friendly plants in all Town plantings. Staff are working to revive a staff climate action committee to evaluate the Town's current policies, including the Integrated Pest Management Policy and its municipal Energy and Climate Protection Plan, and see if updates are needed to codify a planting policy that integrates a pollinator component.
