Pledge Summary

The Town of Carrboro is a progressive, vibrant community located in the Piedmont region of central North Carolina. Over 20,000 diverse residents call Carrboro home. In 2014, the Town stated its intention to promote healthy, sustainable habitats for pollinators by becoming the third municipality in the country to join the Bee City USA initiative. The Town recognizes the importance of avoiding and minimizing impacts of municipal operations on pollinators and other species, has been working to support and protect environmental features for over 40 years, and has been pursuing a Least Toxic Integrated Pest Management Policy since the 1990s. The Town has also committed to protecting and enhancing native ecosystems through its 2017 Community Climate Action Plan. Carrboro Mayor Damon Seils has signed the Mayors' Monarch Pledge to further the Town's commitment to the environment and engage residents in creating and enhancing pollinator habitat throughout the community.

Action Items Committed for 2023

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.
- Plant milkweed and pollinator-friendly native nectar plants along roadsides, medians, or public rights-of-way.
- Host or support a monarch neighborhood challenge to engage neighborhoods and homeowners' associations within the community to increase awareness, support community unity around a common mission, and/or create habitat for the monarch butterfly.
- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.
- Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.

- Launch, expand, or continue an effort to change municipal planting ordinances and practices to include more native milkweed and native nectar producing plants at city properties.
- Reduce or eliminate the use of herbicides, pesticides, or other chemicals that are harmful to monarchs and pollinators and urban wildlife.
- Launch, expand, or continue one or more ordinances to reduce light pollution to benefit urban wildlife.

How are you leveraging the Mayors' Monarch Pledge program to engage marginalized communities, such as low-income communities or communities of color?

Staff have created Town Information Centers throughout the Town to bring information out to residents. Staff have also integrated the Mayors' Monarch Pledge Program and pollinator outreach into its Carrboro In Motion outreach events, which take place throughout the Town in neighborhoods. The Town has created demonstration gardens in public parks, which have high use from members of the community. Staff will also be designing interpretive signs for a riparian restoration area in Anderson Park with information about the importance of riparian buffers and pollinators in multiple languages. Staff use communication strategies from the Inclusive Carrboro Communications & Community Engagement Plan for all outreach events and are currently working to use a Racial Equity Lens Analysis to evaluate the Town's outreach and engagement and inform the way the Town is communicating with Town residents.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

In October, 2014, Carrboro became the third municipality in the country to join Bee City USA. Bees and other pollinators around the globe have experienced dramatic declines due to a combination of habitat loss, use of pesticides, spread of pests and diseases, intensification and industrialization of apiculture, and reduced genetic diversity. Becoming a Bee City USA affiliate publicly announced Carrboro's intention to promote healthy, sustainable habitats for bees and other pollinators. The Town has also committed to improving ecosystem health and resilience in its 2017 Community Climate Action Plan. The Mayors' Monarch Pledge aligns with Carrboro's commitment to promote pollinator habitat, conserve biodiversity and improve ecosystem health and resilience.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

The communication resources and templates have been very helpful as well as the educational materials about native plants. Resources related to planting milkweed seeds would be helpful for Carrboro residents looking to create habitat at their residences.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

Town staff have integrated monarch outreach into annual Town events, such as Open Streets, Carrboro Day, and Pollinator Week. Staff also held a presentation related to native plant landscaping and the removal of invasive species in February 2022 for members of the public to attend: <https://townofcarrboro.org/2873/Ecosystem-Module>.

Plant milkweed and pollinator-friendly native nectar plants along roadsides, medians, or public rights-of-way.

Staff planted butterfly milkweed plants in Henry "Hank" Anderson III Park in 2022 in a riparian restoration area next to a parking lot. (Address: 302 N Carolina Hwy 54 W, Chapel Hill, NC 27516). Staff and advisory board volunteers maintain a pollinator garden located at the intersection of Hillsborough Rd and W Main St (35.913607, -79.079374) along a roadside. In fall 2022, staff planted butterfly milkweed seeds in this pollinator garden.

At the event, volunteers removed invasive privet, multiflora rose, and wisteria using hand tools.

Staff held a volunteer event with children and their parents in March 2023 to make seed balls to plant in a riparian area in a community park. Milkweed seeds were a primary component of the seed ball seed mix.

Town Public Works staff currently make an effort to use native, pollinator-friendly plants in all Town plantings. Staff are working to revive a staff climate action committee to evaluate the Town's current policies, including the Integrated Pest Management Policy and its municipal Energy and Climate Protection Plan, and see if updates are needed to codify a planting policy that integrates a pollinator component.
