Habitat was created as part of a controlled burn at a York Regional Forest tract. Habitat is also created as part of Greening Action Partnership Funding through tree, shrub and pollinator planting in community gardens at schools, residential areas and shared public parks.

How are you leveraging the Mayors' Monarch Pledge program to engage marginalized communities, such as low-income communities or communities of color?

York Region is home to nearly 1.2 million people of all ages and ethnic backgrounds, including more than 230 distinct ethnic groups. York Region is committed to a welcoming and inclusive environment that recognizes and celebrates all dimensions of diversity. These factors are integrated into our communication plans and program offerings. This includes funding to marginalized communities that may not be able to partake including school groups, volunteer organizations and First Nation communities.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

York Region's Greening Strategy delivers on the ground action to support a sustainable natural environment. Many York Region Greening Strategy programs and projects, and other Regional initiatives support pollinator habitat. We appreciate the regular emails, and sharing of resources and information about the Mayor's Monarch Pledge. This pledge allows us to quantify our commitments under our Greening Strategy and allows us to receive recognition for the work that is being done in the communities of York Region.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

We would like to continue having the opportunities to utilize shared resources and information from the National Wildlife Federation. We would benefit from addition of translated resources or recommendations for communicating to a diverse community. Access to stock photographs of pollinator species in our Region may also be useful for campaigns and promotion of the program.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

In 2024, we hosted a workshop for York Region staff members who engage in pollinator projects. The goal was to find out what others are doing and determine ways in which we could align our efforts. In 2025, we will develop a plan to implement what was learned at the workshop to improve our efforts across York Region on pollinator projects and opportunities.

Selected Action Items

Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.

How many plants were sold and/or given away at your event?

892 native trees and shrubs and 418 wildflower kits. Trees included White Pine, Sugar Maple, White Birch, Hackberry, Black Cherry, Red Oak and Basswood. Shrubs included Red Osier Dogwood, Staghorn Sumac, Ninebark and Black Elderberry.
