Recipients of York Region's GAP Fund, part of Pledge 2, provided ample opportunities for marginalized communities to engage with conservation, restoration, and other stewardship activities throughout the Region.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

The Mayor's Monarch Pledge helped York Region to build a healthy community that supports physical and mental well-being. The Pledge allowed York Region to enhance and rehabilitate the natural environment on public and private land to support and promote pollinator habitat.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

Social media has been exceptionally useful in outreach. It allows the Region and other Municipal partners to connect with residents that have more barriers that prevent event attendance, such as the elderly, disabled folks, and children. In the future, more events with Municipal partners would allow York Region to target specific community demographics more effectively and allow the Region to provide more equitable experiences.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

A large source of York Region's impact comes from post-event community involvement. Residents take seedlings/pollinators home and plant them, creating habitats within local residences. Additionally, the support and high interest from partners, such as local libraries and municipal governments, allowed for even more outreach into the York Region community.

Selected Action Items

Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.

Please describe the extent of revisions or maintenance to invasive species removal programs, as well as the practices or techniques used to remove the invasive plants.

Project 1: Wildflower Weeding Bill Fisch Forest Stewardship and Education Centre wildflower area was manually weeded 3 times over the growing season to reduce unwanted non-native and invasive plants and encourage the establishment and spread of desirable native wildflowers and grasses. Herbicide was used to control dog-strangling vine and manual weeding utilized to remove interspersed invasive species. Project 2: Green Action Partnership (GAP) Fund Project areas were prepared for community planting by pulling sapling Buckthorn by hand and stumping larger Buckthorn with chainsaws and putting a "Buckthorn baggie" (thick, black plastic bag) over stumps. This task was completed by almost every project group, due to the widespread growth of invasive Buckthorn. Areas were then replaced with native trees, shrubs, and pollinators by community volunteers to promote biodiversity.
