Cape May Point is a small community at the tip of New Jersey. It is a stopover point on the southern migration path for the Monarch butterflies. Mayor Moffatt, the Environmental Commission and members of the community are committed to providing habitat both as the milkweed host plant and fall nectaring plants.

Action Items Committed for 2023

Where is the demonstration garden located and how does this location relate to the cultural significance of the monarch (if relevant)? (Please provide an address or coordinates, if possible)

We have 3 areas - Pavilion Circle [38.937767, -74.966527], Lake Lily [38.936676, -74.964210], and Triangle Park [38.936676, -74.964210]. (See aerial photo.) Each area provides native milkweed for host plants and native nectar plants for migrating monarchs. (See photo for locations.)

What community organizations, groups, or leaders (if any) did you partner with or engage to complete this effort?

On October 28th, NJ Audubon had a demonstration event in Triangle Park. The event explained about the monarch lifecycle and the importance of "leaving the leaves" for wintering pollinators. (See photo of event and literature.)

In the Winter and Spring we held Nature Walks in town that covered a variety of topics, including Monarchs and their habitat.

What is the total acreage of land treated to remove invasive plants?

We continue to work on removing invasives in Pavilion Circle and have now expanded to the south end of Lake Lily. We communicate through the Environmental Commission and NextDoor.

Please describe the extent of revisions or maintenance to invasive species removal programs, as well as the practices or techniques used to remove the invasive plants.

All of our maintenance is completed through hand removal. The volunteer group meets on Monday mornings, weather permitting. This is also the third year of a 3 year agreement with NJ Audubon to remove invasives around Lake Lily.
