We had discussions on native gardens and maintenance, as well as mowing, with two City wards: Four and One. We had several neighbors of Bishop Creek sign pledges for no-mow zones and native plants as part of our Bishop Creek Watershed-Based Plan. We used a cost-share program to install compost soil amendments with wildflower overseeding, rain gardens, and rainwater harvesting in the Blue Neighborhood location. Additionally, we met with Lahoma Street area neighbors to discuss the new native plantings in Lahoma Grove and how to take those ideas to their homes.

We handed out information and seeds. We did installations in one neighborhood (Blue Neighborhood program). We installed green space and native plantings at Lahoma Grove which will reduce the mowing in the area.
