Pledge Summary

The Town of Mamaroneck has a population of roughly 29,000 and includes the entire Village of Larchmont, the part of the Village of Mamaroneck west of the Mamaroneck River and the Unincorporated Area, which is not part of either Village. We are only about 40 minutes from Manhattan, yet are part of the beautiful Lower Hudson Valley and maintain several conservation areas and parks throughout the Town. We also boast proximity to the Long Island Sound and easy access to highways, airports and commuter train service. Town Supervisor Jaine Elkind Eney, along with the Town's environmental committee (the Sustainability Collaborative), has committed to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators by signing the Mayors' Monarch Pledge. We look forward to engaging residents in building more pollinator habitat throughout the Town.

Action Items Committed for 2025

Communications and Convening

- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.
- Plant milkweed and pollinator-friendly native nectar plants along roadsides, medians, or public rights-of-way.
- Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.

Systems Change

- Reduce or eliminate the use of herbicides, pesticides, or other chemicals that are harmful to monarchs and pollinators and urban wildlife.

We post our events (such as Repair Cafe's Native Plant Table) on our Facebook pages which have a wide reach. Several "customers" at our recent Repair Cafe (Oct. 2025) reported that they came from New Rochelle, a diverse community (re: race and incomes)

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

The Town of Mamaroneck would like to help increase the Monarch Butterfly (and other pollinators) habitat as much as possible in our community. This ultimately affects the food chain and we are trying to raise awareness through our Sustainability Collaborative meetings and emails, through our social media posts and our year-round native plant educational events and plantings themselves.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

Our committees are the most helpful resource we have. Our Town's environmental committee (the Sustainability Collaborative) as well as the Larchmont Pollinator Pathways volunteer group spearhead native plant giveaways, group plantings, educational outreach and more through their brochures, flyers and social media posts. We also use the Mamaroneck Town Supervisor's monthly e-newsletters to get the word out about these events and initiatives.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

We have found additional spaces to plant native gardens, including residents' "right of way" areas in front of their homes for small gardens. We have recruited volunteers from schools we hadn't worked with previously (The Ursuline School in New Rochelle and schools within the Ryeneck School District for example)

92.8 total acres which includes parts of Hommocks Conservation Area, Leatherstocking and Sheldrake River Trails, Premium Marsh Conservation Area, Larchmont Gardens Lake and Brookside Drive, all of which have invasive plants needing removal on a regular basis.

Please describe the extent of revisions or maintenance to invasive species removal programs, as well as the practices or techniques used to remove the invasive plants.

The Town mostly pulls them by hand with loppers, and hand tools, but they also use brush mowers to get to the invasives. For 2025, the Town's Conservation Department and the Town's Highway Department worked on invasive species in all of the above areas. See photos above.

Volunteers worked on this park throughout 2025 and created a lovely area of native plants, a bench and a view of the river which previously couldn't be seen due to all the overgrowth and rubbish.
